
**Nocturnal Animals**



### Mother Goose Corner

Research shows that listening to and reciting nursery rhymes helps young children develop phonological awareness, which means they can hear and focus on the various sounds that make up different words. Children who are exposed to these types of activities in preschool show accelerated gains in learning to read. Help your child learn the following nursery rhyme this month.
